EVENTS & FESTIVALS

TET NGUYEN DAN (LUNAR NEW YEAR):

Tet Nguyen Dan, commonly known as Tet, is Vietnam's most important holiday, celebrating the Lunar New Year and the

arrival of spring. During this time, families come together to honour their ancestors, share special meals, and engage in various traditional customs and activities. The streets are beautifully decorated, and fireworks illuminate the sky. Most shops close for days, and the country, while filled with celebratory spirit, seems to come to a standstill, creating a unique and inspiring sense of unity and joy.

MID-AUTUMN FESTIVAL (TET TRUNG THU): Celebrated on the 15th day of the eighth lunar month, the Mid-Autumn Festival is a joyful time for families to come together and enjoy mooncakes, lantern processions, and lion dances. This festive occasion is especially delightful for children, who revel in the vibrant lanterns and the lively atmosphere.

HÙNG KINGS TEMPLE FESTIVAL: The Hùng Kings Temple Festival commemorates the first king of Vietnam, King Vương. He is a legendary figure, and his origin story is celebrated every year in either April or May as a testament to Vietnam's epic history. To join the festival, travel to the Hùng Temple in Việt Trì City, where you can witness hundreds of lanterns set aloft into the sky on the eve of the festival. On the day of the festival, watch as

processions of pilgrims make their way up the mountain.


- COFFEE CULTURE: Vietnam is the world's second-largest coffee exporter after Brazil, renowned
 for its distinctive coffee culture. The country is especially famous for its robust and flavorful
 Vietnamese iced coffee (cà phê sữa đá), a true delight for coffee lovers.
- LONGEST BEACHES: Vietnam is home to one of the world's longest beaches, Non Nuoc Beach in Da Nang, which stretches over an impressive 30 kilometers (18.6 miles).
- VENDORS ON MOTORBIKES: In Vietnam, the bustling streets are filled with the lively sights and sounds of street vendors selling various goods, from fragrant flowers to delicious food and even functional furniture strapped to the backs of their motorbikes. - WATER PUPPETRY: Water puppetry (múa rối nước) is a traditional Vietnamese art form with a
 history spanning over a thousand years. This enchanting performance features puppets dancing on
 water, brought to life by live music and captivating storytelling.
- VIETNAMESE ZODIAC: The Vietnamese zodiac has notable similarities to the Chinese zodiac but
 with two distinctive variances. Instead of the rabbit, the Vietnamese zodiac includes the cat, and it
 replaces the ox with the water buffalo.
- HIDDEN CAVES: Vietnam is home to some of the world's most awe-inspiring and largest caves, including Son Doong Cave, the largest cave on Earth. Discovered in 1991, Son Doong Cave boasts its own river, jungle, and unique climate, creating a breathtaking subterranean world.

HANOI

Hanoi, the capital of Vietnam, is a city with over 1,000 years of history, captivating visitors with its enchanting Old Quarter, where streets date back to the 19th century. The name Hanoi combines "Ha" (river) and "Noi" (inner, inside), meaning "the city located within the river," aptly describing its location on the banks of the Red River. Discover stunning impressionist artworks at the Fine Arts Museum, or explore contemporary masterpieces at Manzi and the Vietnam Art Gallery. Hoan Kiem Lake, the vibrant heart of Hanoi, buzzes with activity as locals enjoy morning walks and serene sunsets. This dynamic blend of history, art, and daily life creates an unforgettable experience for all who visit.



· Hanoi is famous for its "tube houses," which are narrow but extend far back. This unique architectural style emerged due to high land taxes that were based on the width of the street-facing facade. As a result, residents built narrow, multi-story houses to minimize tax costs while maximizing living space.

BÚN CHÁ: Bún chả, a dish closely associated with Hanoi, is a delightful combination of flavours and textures. It features grilled pork meatballs served in a bowl of cold, tangy broth and a plate of rice noodles. This savoury meal is completed with fresh greens, including perilla leaves, lettuce, coriander, and morning glory, making it a quintessential taste of Hanoi's vibrant culinary scene.

BÁNH CUỐN: Bánh cuốn is a beloved Vietnamese street food featuring delicate, steamed rice rolls filled with pork, mushrooms, or both. Typically enjoyed for breakfast, these rolls are served with fried shallots, sweet and sour fish sauce, fresh herbs, and a tangy lime-based sauce. Crafting these ultra-thin, translucent rolls requires exceptional skill. The combination of flavours and textures in bánh cuốn makes it a delightful culinary experience. reflecting the artistry of Vietnamese cuisine.


BÁNH TRÔI: Bánh trôi is a delightful Vietnamese dessert from glutinous rice balls filled with sweet dark palm sugar. The sticky dough, a blend of plain and glutinous rice flour mixed with water, is shaped into small balls and cooked until they float. Typically associated with northern Vietnam and Hanoi, these treats are served fresh, sprinkled with roasted sesame seeds or grated coconut.

truly lets you savour this stunning region. Spend your days kayaking, swimming, and exploring limestone caves and floating villages. As night falls, relax on deck under a canopy of stars, experiencing the serene beauty of Ha Long Bay like never before.

WATER PUPPETRY: Experience the enchanting art of water puppetry in Hanoi! Begin your adventure at a workshop brimming with wooden puppet parts. Delight in a traditional theatre performance before crafting your own dragon puppet and painting it with a rainbow of colours.

WALK AROUND HOAN KIEM LAKE: Take a leisurely stroll around Hoan Kiem Lake, a peaceful oasis in the city's heart. Explore Ngoc Son Temple, located on a small island that can be reached via the iconic red Huc Bridge. The lake and temple are ideal for relaxation and quiet contemplation amid the urban bustle.



BEST TIME

From March to early June or September to November, you can expect sunny skies, pleasant temperatures, and ideal exploration and outdoor activities conditions. These periods are perfect for cruising in Ha Long Bay, exploring the bustling streets of Hanoi, or trekking through the scenic landscapes of Sapa.

PROMOTIONAL SEASON

Late June to August brings diverse weather to Northern Vietnam. Hanoi experiences hot and humid conditions, with temperatures reaching up to 40°C and frequent heavy rains. In Halong Bay, expect regular downpours and occasional cruise cancellations due to tropical storms.

SHOULDER SEASON

Ha Long Bay is often shrouded in heavy mist from December to February. In Hanoi, December ushers in cool, misty weather, with temperatures dipping to 10°C from late December through March.

OLD QUARTER (HOAN KIEM)

The heart of Hanoi is known for its bustling streets, historic charm, and vibrant atmosphere. This area is packed with street vendors, cafes, and shops, making it a lively place to stay. Its central location offers easy access to key attractions like Hoan Kiem Lake, Ngoc Son Temple, and numerous markets and eateries.



FRENCH QUARTER


HAI BA TRUNG

LANDMARKS



THE OLD QUARTER

The Old Quarter of Hanoi is a lively network of narrow streets historically associated with a particular trade or craft. This vibrant area features a mix of colonial buildings, ancient temples, and local markets. Tourists can explore the bustling streets, try tasty street food, and purchase one-of-a-kind souvenirs while enjoying Hanoi's genuine appeal.

HO CHI MINH MAUSOLEUM

The Ho Chi Minh Mausoleum is a monumental site where visitors can pay their respects to Vietnam's revered leader, Ho Chi Minh. This grand structure is in Ba Dinh Square, where Ho Chi Minh declared Vietnam's independence in 1945. The lush gardens and impressive architecture complement the mausoleum's solemn atmosphere.

TEMPLE OF LITERATURE

The Temple of Literature, Vietnam's first university, dates back to 1070 and is dedicated to Confucius. This well-preserved temple complex features traditional Vietnamese architecture, lush gardens, and tranquil courtyards. Visitors can explore the Stelae of Doctors, stone tablets inscribed with the names of scholars, and soak in the historical and cultural significance of this revered site.



HOI AN

Discover Hoi An, a unique UNESCO World Heritage site where history, culture, and beauty intertwine. Situated on the banks of the Thu Bon River, this ancient town is a living testament to the past, with its wellpreserved architecture that spans from traditional wooden Chinese shophouses to vibrant French colonial buildings. The streets come alive with the glow of colourful lanterns, casting a magical spell, especially after sunset. Visitors can enjoy the rich cultural heritage, vibrant markets, and tantalizing cuisine.



- · Hoi An is mainly situated less than two meters above sea level, making it susceptible to rising ocean levels and climate change. In recent years, the town has faced considerable flooding, including the most severe on record in November 2017. Consequently, UNESCO has identified Hoi An as a location at risk due to climate change impacts.
- · Parts of Hoi An Ancient Town are designated as pedestrian-only zones during certain times of the day, making it one of the best car-free towns in the world. This allows visitors to explore the town's charming streets without the hustle of motor traffic

CAO LÂU: Cao Lau is a signature noodle dish of Hoi An. It features thick, chewy noodles made from rice soaked in water from the ancient Bá Lễ well. The dish is topped with slices of savoury roast pork, fresh herbs, bean sprouts, and crispy rice crackers, all enhanced with a flavorful broth. The unique texture and taste of the noodles set Cao Lau apart from other Vietnamese noodle dishes.

BÁNH BAO BÁNH VAC: White Rose Dumplings, or Banh Bao Banh Vac. are delicate, translucent dumplings shaped like roses. made from a special rice flour dough. They are filled with a mixture of shrimp or pork, with a hint of garlic and shallots, and steamed to perfection. These dumplings are served with a sweet and tangy dipping sauce made from shrimp broth, lemon, sugar, and chilies. The name "White Rose" comes from the dumplings' appearance, which resembles a blossoming flower.

COM GA HOI AN: Com Ga Hoi An is a flavorful chicken rice dish that showcases the region's culinary simplicity and depth of flavour. It consists of shredded poached chicken served over turmeric-infused rice, cooked in rich chicken broth. Fresh herbs, pickled vegetables, and a flavorful chicken broth accompany the dish. The combination of tender chicken, aromatic rice, and vibrant accompaniments makes Com Ga Hoi An a beloved local favourite.

ACTIVITES A BASKET BOAT TOUR: Cam Thanh
Coconut Village offers unique basket boat

tours through scenic waterways and coconut groves. This fun and interactive experience includes learning traditional fishing techniques and enjoying the area's natural beauty.

VISIT TRA QUE VEGETABLE VILLAGE: Explore Tra Que Vegetable Village, known for its organic farming practices. Here, you can participate in traditional gardening activities, learn about local herbs and vegetables, and enjoy a farm-totable culinary experience.

VISIT THE MY SON SANCTUARY: Take a day trip to My Son

Sanctuary, an ancient complex of Hindu temples built by the Champa Kingdom. These impressive ruins in a lush valley offer a fascinating insight into Vietnam's ancient history and religious heritage.





BEST TIME

The best time to visit Hoi An is from February to May. The weather is warm and pleasant, with low humidity and minimal rainfall, perfect for exploring the ancient town, beaches, and outdoor activities. Average temperatures range from 24°C to 33°C.

PROMOTIONAL SEASON

The least favourable time to visit Hoi An is from September to January due to the rainy season. This period's unpredictable weather and high humidity can disrupt travel plans and limit outdoor activities, making it challenging to enjoy the city's attractions fully.

SHOULDER SEASON

May to August can be scorching, but ocean breezes and low-rise buildings keep Hoi An pleasant. You can still enjoy beaches and outdoor activities despite higher temperatures and humidity. However, this period attracts more tourists, leading to crowded attractions and higher accommodation prices.

- · With over 9 million residents, Ho Chi Minh City is the largest and most populous city in Vietnam, serving as the country's economic and cultural hub.
- · Tourists beware: Although the traffic light rules in Vietnam are no different from the rest of the world, in Ho Chi Minh City, as well as in other parts of Vietnam, a yellow traffic light often means "speed up" to many local drivers. While the official rule is to slow down and prepare to stop, the common practice is to accelerate to pass through the intersection before the light turns red.

PHO: Pho is a renowned Vietnamese dish celebrated worldwide for its delicious and comforting flavours. It is served as a main dish, with each bowl unique, crafted with either chicken or beef broth that's simmered for hours. The broth contains flavorful herbs, spices, chewy noodles, tender beef slices, and crunchy sprouts.

CHÁ GIÒ: Chả giò, also known as nem rán, are beloved Vietnamese fried spring rolls. Filled with a savory mixture of pork and shrimp, they can be enjoyed as appetizers or main dishes. Often paired with fresh vegetables and flavorful dips, these rolls showcase the delectable nature of Vietnamese cuisine with their crispy exterior and deliciously rich filling.


BÚN THIT NƯƠNG: Bún thit nướng, a beloved Vietnamese dish, combines marinated grilled pork, rice vermicelli noodles, and fresh vegetables and herbs in a harmonious bowl. It's crowned with nước chấm, a tangy fish sauce blend of lime or lemon juice and sugar, adding a perfect zing. While especially popular in Southern Vietnam, it shares similarities with Hanoi's bún chả. Beyond its traditional form, there are delightful regional variations featuring tofu, other meats, and seafood, showcasing the dish's versatility and widespread appeal.

ACTIVITES VISIT BEN THANH MARKET: This bustling marketplace is a symbol of Ho

Chi Minh City. It offers a variety of goods, from fresh produce to souvenirs, and is a great place to experience local cuisine.

ENJOY A VESPA TOUR: A Vespa tour in Saigon is a must-do for its unique blend of excitement and cultural immersion. Riding a vintage Vespa offers an authentic way to explore the city's bustling streets, iconic landmarks, and hidden gems. BEST TIME

December to March, since the weather is cooler and less humid, with temperatures ranging from 21°C to 34°C. Rainfall is minimal, making it perfect for exploring the city and enjoying outdoor activities.

PROMOTIONAL SEASON

The rainy season is from July to November, during which the city experiences heavy rainfall and occasional storms. Although the lush scenery may appeal to some tourists and the city is less crowded, frequent downpours can disrupt travel plans and make outdoor activities less enjoyable.

SHOULDER SEASON

The weather gets hotter and more humid from April to June, with temperatures often exceeding 35°C. While still manageable for travel, the heat can be intense, and occasional rain showers may occur. However, it's less crowded than peak season, which can be a plus.

DISTRICT 1

District 1 is the heart of Ho Chi Minh City, bustling with activity and home to many of the city's top attractions, including Ben Thanh Market, Notre-Dame Cathedral, and the Saigon Opera House. It's a convenient area with a wide range of accommodations, from luxury hotels to budget hostels, and many restaurants, bars, and shops.



DISTRICT 3

NOTRE DAME CATHEDRAL BASILICA OF SAIGON

Built by French settlers, this famous cathedral showcases stunning neo-Romanesque architecture and twin bell towers, attracting tourists and locals alike.

SAIGON CENTRAL POST OFFICE

Designed by Gustave Eiffel, this beautiful colonialera building still functions as a post office. It is admired for its architecture, including a large portrait of Ho Chi Minh.

BITEXO FINANCIAL TOWER

This modern skyscraper has an observation deck offering panoramic views of the city, perfect for observing Ho Chi Minh City's skyline above.



DA NANG

Da Nang, a coastal city in central Vietnam, offers a perfect blend of natural beauty, modernity, and cultural richness. Known for its stunning beaches like My Khe and Non-Nuoc, it also features impressive landmarks such as the Marble Mountains and the Dragon Bridge. Visitors can explore the ancient town of Hoi An nearby or venture into the breathtaking Ba Na Hills. With its vibrant street life, delicious cuisine, and warm hospitality. Da Nang is an enchanting destination for travellers seeking a memorable experience.



. THE LONGEST CABLE CAR RIDE: Da Nang is home to a record-holding cable car. The Ba Na Hills Cable Car made it into the Guinness Book of World Records for being the longest one-wire sling with a length of 5,777.61m. It also holds the record for the longest distance between stations at 1,368.93m, the longest unpatched wire in the world at 11,587m, and the heaviest cable roll at 141.24 tons.

BANH NAM & BANH BOT LOC: These are two popular rice dumpling cakes in Da Nang. They are . filled with shrimp and pork, and the outer layers are made of rice flour. Once shaped, the raw cakes are placed on banana leaves and steamed until cooked. Many people enjoy the chewy texture of these cakes, which feels like it is melting in your mouth. A drop of fish sauce would be a perfect addition to enhance the flavour and make the cakes more savoury.

BANH TRANG CUAN THIT HEO: Da Nang's sliced pork rolled with rice paper, or banh trang cuon thit heo, is a must-try. The dish features tender pork wrapped in softened rice paper along with herbs, vegetables, and sweet and sour fish sauce.

BANNH MI: In Da Nang, traditional Banh Mi is just as good as the one in Saigon. It's roasted over a coal stove until crispy and then customized with ingredients like jambon, meat, fried egg, grilled fish cake, homemade pate, cilantro, and vegetable pickles. You can find these delicious Banh Mi at longstanding food stalls in Da Nang, making great photo opportunities.

ACTIVITIES EXPLORE THE BA NA HILLS: Take a cable car ride to the Ba Na Hills, a

mountain resort with stunning views, French colonial architecture, and the famous Golden Bridge. The area offers attractions like the Fantasy Park amusement center and beautiful gardens. The cool mountain air and panoramic vistas provide a refreshing escape.

DISCOVER THE SON TRA PENINSULA: When visiting the Son Tra Peninsula or Monkey Mountain, you can enjoy lush forests, scenic views, and wildlife, including the rare redshanked douc langur. 
SON TRA PENINSULA
